Course description	The Course focuses on the origins of the European and Western legal order, from the end of the 18 th Century to the advent of the Constitution of the Italian Republic (1948), reviewing the history of constitutions and codifications, from a comparative-historical perspective, in order to highlight its mutual influences and peculiarities.			
Course targets and expected learning outcomes	Students will have a good awareness of the various European and American legal experiences between the $19^{\rm th}$ and the $20^{\rm th}$ Centuries.			
Program (contents, teaching methods)	The Course is divided into two parts: The first part of it will focus on the origins of modern constitutionalism both in Europe and America from a diachronic point of view. The second part will focus on the 19th Century codifications - with particular reference to the Napoleonic and Austrian legal experiences - and the different codes of the Italian pre-unification States. A specific attention will therefore be given to the problem of the codification of law in the Kingdom of Italy (1861-1946). As a prerequisite, students are required to have adequate knowledge of modern and contemporary history, in order to understand the legal issues treated and their social and cultural relevance.
