Course description	The course is divided into lectures of frontal teaching, for a total of 4-6 hours per week, divided into three days; integrative teaching activities. The following program will be addressed.
Course aims and expected learning outcomes	The course aims to illustrate the most recent reforms about public administrations. At the end of the course, the student should know the configuration of the institutions and regulations according to the program below. <u>Knowledge and understanding</u> : the student must acquire a full knowledge of the basic institutions of administrative law. <u>Applied knowledge and understanding</u> : the student will have to correctly apply the reference regulations, demonstrate to know how to manage an administrative process, draw up a draft measure. <u>Autonomy of judgment</u> : the student will have to be able to independently evaluate the phases of the administrative procedures (and to elaborate the consequent outline of provision). <u>Communication skills</u> : the student must be able to intervene in a debate in the classroom, supporting their arguments on specific issues drawn from practical administrative experience. <u>Ability to learn</u> : the student will have to be able to deal with the analysis of legal texts, interpreting the sources of administrative law independently, resolving administrative issues of practical importance.
Program (contents, methods of execution) Possible distinction between programs of attending and non-attending students	Part 1 – Administrative law and its sources (I. Introduction, II. Regulatory function and sources of law). Part 2 – Functional profiles (III. The administrative legal relationship, IV. The measure, V. The procedure, VI. The controls, VII. The accountability). Part 3 – Organizational profiles (VIII. The organization, IX. Public Services, X. Personnel, XI. The public goods, XII. Contracts, XIII. Finance). Part 4 – Administrative justice (XIV. The general lines of the system).
Estimate of the time commitment required for individual study	Without prejudice to the University didactic regulations and the subjectivity of the study methods of each student, it is estimated, by default, a study commitment of 350 hours.
Teaching methods used	Lessons of frontal teaching, in-depth exercises, seminars.

Attendance modes	Attendance of the course is optional.			
Evaluation methods	Oral examination. For attending students there is an exemption test on the part of program addressed in the first part of the course. The final examination is oral. In order to pass the exam, the student must demonstrate to know sufficiently the program in its entirety and to be able to express it in a satisfactory language on a syntactic and technical level. The total or partial lack of these basic elements will entail the negative evaluation of the test and therefore the student's unsuitability to pass the exam. Once the presence of these minimum requirements has been established, the evaluation of the student, aimed at identifying the final grade (from 18 to 30) will be carried out using the following parameters shown in schematic form:
