<b>Course Details</b>	Political Sociology in Organization of Public and Private Administrations (72 hours) (Disciplinary Scientific Area: SPS/11- Political Sociology).

<b>Course Description</b>	<p>The course will be structured around three distinct modules:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. An analysis of fundamental models and categories developed by the most important classical and contemporary political sociologists in relation to political phenomena (political power, the State, political parties, social movements, elites, socialization, political culture, globalization).</li> <li>2. Issues related to the influence of the new media on political communication and socio-political transformations in the global world.</li> <li>3. Organization of seminars on specific topics.</li> </ol>
<b>Course Objectives and Expected Learning Outcomes</b>	<p>The aim of the course is to make available to the student main theories and the most important analytical frameworks in order to understand the most relevant political events.</p> <p><u>Knowledge and understanding:</u> At the end of the course, each student will become familiar with the most important categories and analytical perspectives for the understanding of political processes and phenomena.</p> <p><u>Knowledge and applied understanding skills:</u> At the end of the course each student should be able to apply specific categories and analytical perspectives in relation to Politics, Power, State, Public Administration, Political Parties, Social Movements, Elite, Political Classes and Political Recruitment, Socialization Process, Political Cultures, Political Communication, Globalization.</p> <p><u>Making judgments:</u> Furthermore, the student should be able to acquire skills to make a critical reading of political processes and phenomena, according to a comparative perspective.</p> <p><u>Communication skills:</u> The student should develop the ability to formulate reflections with an adequate specialized language, in relation to conflict processes and phenomena.</p> <p><u>Learning skills:</u> The student will be required to find data relating to specific conflict phenomena, to attend seminars, conferences and other social and political activities.</p>
