Course Description	The course provides the presentation of cases and problematic issues about civil, procedural and substantive law, that have to be solved by the student with the use of interpretative method acquired during the course of studies.														
Course Objectives and Expected Learning Results	At the end of the course the student will have to demonstrate <u>proficiency</u> in "practical" application of the knowledge acquired during the course of studies. The student must be able to solve concrete cases and write legal documents in the field of civil law.														
Program (contents, execution method)	Cases and issues about: natural persons and legal persons; rights in rem legal situations; obligations and contracts; family law and inheritance; civil liability and tort. Course attendance is strongly recommended because of the contents of the subject. During the course cases and issues other than those contained in the texts will be addressed in the classroom.
